Instead of considering what being is, we can consider what substance is. Aristotle first rejects the idea that substance is the ultimate substrate of a thing, that which remains when all its accidental properties are stripped away.

Aristotle was the first philosopher to formalise the subject of Metaphysics. As Aristotle explains, Metaphysics is the study of the One Substance (and its Properties) which exists and causes / connects all things, and is therefore the necessary foundation for all human knowledge.

However, later in The Metaphysics Aristotle will reexamine whether this statement is actually the case. In Chapter 4 Aristotle states that substance can admit of only essential attributes (intrinsic characteristics) and not accidental ones. Essence defines something in a primary way. Moreover, a substance is identical to its essence.

On the Soul (Greek: περι ψυχης *Peri Psychēs*; Latin: *De Anima*) is a major treatise written by Aristotle c. 350 BC. His discussion centres on the kinds of souls possessed by different kinds of living things, distinguished by their different operations. Thus plants have the capacity for nourishment and reproduction, the minimum that must be possessed by any kind of living organism.

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There is no modern edition of Scot's translation of either Aristotle's *Metaphysics* or Averroes's "Long Commentary" on the *Metaphysics*. The best text we have is the early printed Iunctas edition of 1562-1574, which contains Scot's translation of the "Long Commentary" interspersed with two translations of the *Metaphysics*, one of which is also Scot's.

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
